

### **BCHNS 2025 SYMPOSIUM**

Opening Remarks from Geertje Boschma

Thirty people attended the B.C. History of Nursing Symposium 2025 in person with an additional twenty people online from around the world. The symposium took place on a beautiful spring day in April at the Cecil Green Park House on the UBC campus. Nan Martin reflected on 'how lovely the event was, in a beautiful setting with just the right number of people so we could talk with everyone'. Nan told us she had read Francis Mansbridge's book that evening & thought it was "wonderful". Our guest speaker, Megan Davies' presentation explored the work of a group of nurses pivotal to the establishment of an early home support society on BC's Hornby Island in the late 1970s.



The Hornby Island nurses - many of them retirees - served as volunteer members of the society's board, transcending their professional practice by engaging with a new provincial "social health" program, sometimes as health activists representing elders from their remote rural community. Yet they remained definitively nurses. Themes of nursing leadership, nursing identity, nursing practices of organization and management and shared nursing knowledge and ways of seeing shaped their work, and also this study.

Frances Ellen Benedict (1902-1997)

Just over 100 years ago Frances Ellen Benedict (1902-1997) graduated from UBC in 1923 with a B.A. She taught at various schools in BC, also pursuing graduate studies. When her mother died, she studied at St. Paul's Hospital, achieving the highest marks in the provincial nursing examinations. She stayed on at St. Paul's as a teacher, later becoming Educational Director.

After nine years she left for nursing positions in Montreal and later Manitoba before returning to British Columbia, where she joined the teaching staff at the Royal Columbian School of Nursing. Here she became Educational Director until her retirement. Students and others remember her for her kindness and understanding.

Welcome to springtime and to a special year for our organization. This year marks the 35th year of the BCHNS. An occasion for celebration, and an opportunity to acknowledge the important work of our founding members. They now 35 years ago, envisioned and founded a professional practice interest group on BC nursing history, under the umbrella of the Registered Nurses Association of BC (RNABC). In 2008, this group continued as the BC History of Nursing Society, when the RNABC changed into the College of RNs of BC (CRNBC), and interest groups discontinued. Just recently, at the Nursing History Symposium on April 14, we celebrated the 35th anniversary milestone of the organization.



Megan Davies delivered a fantastic keynote presentation on The Nurses of Hornby Island, followed by a Panel about the BCHNS' contributions to nursing history, presented by Margaret Scaia, Francis Mansbridge, Nan Martin, Lenore Radom and Anita Petersen. We also presented the booklet on the history of the BCHNS, BC Nursing History, written by Francis Mansbridge for the occasion.

This newsletter includes photographs with descriptions of the event with more to follow on our blog and renewed website. A recording of the Symposium presentations will become available in the UBC Library's Open Collection. Once the recording is in the library system, we will share the link with you.

Another milestone has been the renewal of our website. We truly acknowledge the valuable work of Lenore Radom, Beth Fitzpatrick and Margaret Scaia in collaboration with Anita Petersen on the website renewal. The website is the key communication tool for our organization and the public at large. It features BCHNS' overall goal, that is, to discover, disseminate and preserve nursing history.

We also thank the other members of the Board of Directors for their continued leadership, and last but not least, thank you all, our members and student members, who constitute the BCHNS. We held several online meetings and presentations and engaged in lively conversation. Great you were able to join. Sadly, during the course of the year, we lost several of our longstanding members who have passed away, Marjory Ralston, Carol Harrison, and Cheryl Entwistle. We keep them in our memory, and acknowledge their important contributions to the organization. A special tribute to them is also on our website.

We held the annual general meeting on April 15 via zoom. The full report on the AGM will be included in our summer bulletin, which you will receive in a couple of months. In June, the board and committee members will hold a final meeting to plan for next year's activities. We will start next fall with an open meeting and presentation for everyone to join on September 16, the details of which will follow later. Next fall we also anticipate the move into the new building along with the UBC School of Nursing, likely sometime later in the fall. The in-kind support of the SON will continue, offering space to meet and to store the artifact collection. I wish you happy reading of the newsletter, and, if you have not already done so, have a look at our renewed website, which keeps us up to date on nursing history resources and events.

### PAGES OF HISTORY

#### In Honour of Kathleen Viola Raisbeck October 1929 – July 2024 Sponsored by Perioperative Nurses Association of BC

Kathleen [Kay] was born in Hanna, Alberta and was the eldest of 5 children. She was raised on a farm just east of Drumheller until the family moved to Craigmyle.

At the age of 18 Kay made her way to BC to pursue a career in Nursing. She began her training at Essondale Nursing School where she graduated as a Psychiatric Nurse. Kay then moved to Vancouver General Hospital School of Nursing from where she graduated as a Register Nuse in 1954. After a few months working at the Calgary General Hospital, Kay then returned to Vancouver General Hospital [VGH] and began her extensive career there retiring in 1983.

In 1963 Kay was awarded a Diploma in Administration of Hospital Nursing Units at Univer-

sity of BC's Autumn Congregation, and became Charge nurse in the Eye & ENT department. Before retiring Kay was appointed Supervisor for Scheduling working alongside the anaesthesiologists, and for Equipment and Supplies in the Operating Rooms at VGH. During this time, she was elected 8TH President of the BC Operating Room Nurses group [now PNABC], a position in which she served from 1980 to 1982.

Following retirement Kay expanded her volunteering to include a variety of roles at VanDusen Gardens including as a guide, a volunteer in the membership department, and assisting with the Christmas lights. She also assisted with the running of the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association where she became a life member. Kay was an exceptional nurse and pillar of the profession. She was also a great supporter and champion for the BC Operating Room Nurses Group and VanDusen Gardens.

#### September 16th at 4pm Guest Speaker

Catherine A. Floe will share with us her new biography which focuses on the life of her mother, born Mary Brigid Power and nicknamed "Lil" (1912–1993). In telling Lil's story; Ever a Nurse also touches on nurses' training in the 1930s and the early treatment of infectious diseases, and it documents one Irish Catholic family's post-war immigration to Canada. After moving to Vancouver in 1957, Lil Sheehan resumed her long-suspended nursing career, with sterling success—as a private nurse. Her expert professional skills, caring manner, and charming personality made her much in demand by Vancouver's elite established families.
